International Antarctic Centre (left)

Located in the suburb of Harewood, Christchurch, close to Christchurch International Airport. It is one of the major tourist attractions of the city.

Punting on the Avon (right)

Sightseeing rides in a small, flat-bottomed boat poled by a guide dressed in Edwardian clothing.



The Canterbury Museum (left)

The Museum is located in the central city of Christchurch, in the city's Cultural Precinct. The museum was established in 1867 with Julius von Haast—whose collection formed its core—as its first director.

The Christchurch Art Centre (right)

The Arts Centre is a hub for arts, crafts and entertainment in Christchurch. It is located in the neo-gothic former University of Canterbury buildings, the majority of which were designed by Benjamin Mountford.



Christchurch Botanic Gardens (left)

The Garden located in the central city of Christchurch, were founded in 1863 when an English oak was planted to commemorate the solemnisation of the marriage of Prince Albert and Princess Alexandra of Denmark.

The Christchurch Art Gallery (right)

Te Puna o Waiwhetu, commonly known as the Christchurch Art Gallery, is the public art gallery of the city of Christchurch. It is funded by Christchurch City



Hagley Park (left)

Hagley Park is the largest urban space in Christchurch, and was created in 1855 by the Provincial Government. According to the government's decree at that time, Hagley Park is "reserved forever as a public park.

Cathedral Square (left)

Locally known simply as the Square, is the geographical centre and heart of Christchurch, where the city's Anglican Cathedral, Christchurch Cathedral is located.

The Christchurch Gondola (right)

The gondola is a tourist attraction service offered by Christchurch Attractions in Christchurch. It is based in Heathcote Valley and it traverses the slopes of Mount Cavendish in the Port Hills.



The Cardboard Cathedral (left)

The Cathedral is the transition pro-cathedral of the Anglican Diocese of Christchurch opened in August 2013. It was designed by architect Shigeru Ban and seats around 700 people.
