Across the desk of the President:

What a year so far, with bushfires (which we were endeavoring to support through our Warringah Open), however, the floods made

short work of that, and we had to reschedule until the 7th March. This will be a busy weekend for archers, with the Warringah Open being on the 7th and the International Women's Day shoot being held on the 8th March. Members who were unable to compete in the event earlier in the year, still have the opportunity to register on line.

We have also commenced Season 1 of our AdBow / KidBow program, which will go through until the end of May, with currently 28 registered members, this will be capped at 30 and there is some really nice styles showing through, details on qualifying scores set out in the newsletter.

Lights / Wi-Fi – just a friendly reminder that whoever is last to leave club grounds, should ensure that all lights are turned off....and also that the Wi-Fi is disconnected, it will result in savings in the long run.

Locks: Over the last couple of weeks we have noticed that someone keeps closing the padlocks. This is disappointing, considering not all members have keys, and they then have to call in a committee member to come and undo, so that we can secure the club facilities. Can you please be mindful of this, and if you do see a closed lock lying around, please highlight it to one of the committee members.

Target Pins: Again with school now being in session, it is important that any pegs that are taken out onto the field of play are returned.

BECOMING AN APPROVED EVENT JUDGE.

An Archery Australia members may apply for approval as an Event Judge, to officiate at QRE's. In order to be considered, the person must:

1. Be over 18 years of age,
2. Have had more than 2 years involvement in the sport, and
3. Have successfully completed the Club Official online module, Principles of Judging module and the Target and Indoor Module and/ or the Field module as provided by Archery Australia, and
4. Have a current Working With Children/Vulnerable People registration number.

Step 1 – Complete the Online Training Courses

First, complete the Club Official online training course, then the Principles of Judging module, then, either the Field or Target/Indoor (or both). Visit the Archery Australia Online Training site located at

Step 2 – Apply to Register as an Event Judge

Once you have successfully completed the Club Official, Principles of Judging and either the Field or Target/Indoor (or both) modules online, you can [click here](#) to lodge your application to become an Event Judge.

The Board of Archery Australia recently approved a number of amendments to the Shooting Rules since the 2018 version.

Amendments:

7.4.1 - Minimum of six archers from two clubs in an open tournament or minimum of 10 from one club

4.3 - The Archer's Diary Calculator added to determine changes to ratings (fixed handicap changed to floating handicap)

12.2.9 - Added 80 metres overshoot zone-clout, which will mean that the maximum we can shoot at the club from now on is 100m.

Selection process for the 2020 World Archery Field Championships is now available.
