However, our own funds were about \$22,000 short of the amount that we have to contribute. NEW ISSUE OF BOW INTERNATIONAL HAS ARRIVED

Titled "*The Barebow Issue"*, it has been placed in the clubroom for member perusal before being available for general loan when the next edition arrives.

Including the editorial, there are 27 out of a total 64 pages of this issue devoted to <u>barebow archery</u>, or more correctly <u>barebow</u> <u>recurve archery</u>. Though called "The Barebow Issue", there is not a single mention of using the compound in its barebow form!

So if barebow recurve is for you, this is the issue to read.

- Articles cover:
- Equipment;
- How older archers are moving into barebow;
 A couple of interviews with prominent users
- of the sightless/clicker-less recurve;
 The place of barebow in Russia (something that we have all been wondering about);
- Fabrication of a barebow riser,



• And possibly the most significant article of them all, information on stringwalking, facewalking and gap shooting.

The latter articles do cover a little about equipment set up, but I thought there could have been more about tiller adjustment and bow tuning in an edition devoted almost solely to barebow recurve.

While the issue has 21 and 2 pages devoted to advertisements and the front/back covers, respectively, there are also pages of news and other articles. As we get this periodical late after publication, details on archery team GBR selection are provided with 60 days until the games! There are 3 pages covering the 2021 world cup in Guatemala. There are also reviews of an undershirt for the cooler weather and of some performance eyewear to assist in maximising aiming. Finally there is a Q&A section covering strength training for archers.

SHOOTING

(for more details, see the minutes of the general meeting held on Tuesday, 17 August)

A meeting of the Shooting Committee was held on 11 August to discuss next year's calendar. Present were James Henriks, Mariagrazia Panetta, Alan Chapple, Christine Favre, Carol Ashlee and Graham Winston.

In the discussion and review of this year's calendar, comments submitted by four club members were taken into consideration. It was decided that we would keep:

- a single breakup day event.
- the same approximate make-up of short and longdistance rounds for the 2022 calendar
- working on using the portables as much as possible
- working on including the shorter distance in the middle of the field where possible

There will be a further opportunity to comment on the draft 2022 calendar in late September.

Field Shooting: at the general meeting it was agreed that two field shoots (one on Saturday and one on Sunday) would be included in the 2022 calendar as a trial.

If enough shooters attend, then it will become a regular event from 2023 onwards.

Club Championships: it was also decided to trial, in 2022, an additional round in the Club Championships for juniors and newer senior members who are not able to shoot from 60m. For juniors this would be a 72 arrow round, and it would take place in the morning with an award for each gender and bow type.

For tyros it would be a Junior Canberra, again with an award for each gender and bow type.

END OF YEAR BREAK-UP SHOOT (Sunday 12 December)

Planning for the last event of the year is underway! This is a novelty shoot followed by a lunch provided by the club for juniors and seniors. Attire appropriate for Christmas should be worn—NOT club uniform, unless elves, angels etc are club members:-

Archers should arrive at 9.30am; shooting will commence at 10am and conclude around 11.30am

We will be shooting at novelty faces that YOU have made so start thinking about something different/innovative/ entertaining for us to shoot at! Scoring will be at the whim of the Tournament Director.

Lunch will be 12:00 - 1:00pm, organised by the Social Coordinator.
