

AAC INDOOR VENUE PROJECT

A Sub-committee has been created to investigate the possibility of establishing a Club indoor venue.

The Chair is Jean-Michel Favre; the first meeting was attended by Gerry Davies, Lorraine Nicoll, Mark Newton, Ken Osborne, Chris Balla and Jeff Nicoll, with apologies from Roger Lyons-Davis, Tony White, Andy Cooper and Terry Reilly.

An agenda of actions was formulated, in brief:

To survey AAC members to quantify internal needs;

To email neighbouring clubs to assess potential external needs;

The creation of a basic AAC ID card

The basic business case to establish venue specifications and potential budget;

A survey of existing networks (who knows whom)

The identification of potential venues

To visit potential venues and analyse feedback before proposing a way forward at the AAC AGM.

FROM THE LIBRARIAN, STEVE SYKES

Latest edition of Bow International now in the clubroom

As usual, this edition of Bow International provides varied reading that will appeal in some way to most archers. Headlined as THE FITNESS SPECIAL, not surprisingly a number of article focus on this very theme!

First up is an article titled "Fixing Fitness", suggesting that 2022 should be the year we transform ourselves and our shooting. Other articles on the theme include:

A **Q&A** in which some of the elite are asked how they stay on top of their game;

"How to Get Organised" and maximise range time;

"Building a Strong Back", something that is essential not only for archery, but also life itself;

"The Game Changer", which suggests if you only do one thing, then do press-ups (aka push-ups)!

"Mobility for Archers", a more academic piece discusses joints and anatomy to help reduce injury and increase flexibility.

"The Mental Game": Of course, physical fitness is important, but it is not all that counts, and a well-intentioned article focuses on maintaining focus and concentration.

OTHER ARTICLES COVER:

"Fine-tuning, When to Adjust": very small equipment adjustments while shooting improve tightness of groups.

"Starting Out" covers bow tuning in an article specifically designed for newcomers to recurve archery.

Showcase Article: If you are in the market for a spotting scope, this is the very topic for you, from entry point models right up to a nose-bleedingly expensive end Zeiss model (remember prices given are in pounds sterling).



Finally, there is coverage of the Antalya World Cup 2022 event and, for archery historians/archaeologists, a piece on Neolithic Yew Bows from the alpine region.



This *Issue 160 of Bow International* has been placed on the clubroom table for members to read before being available for loan when the next edition arrives.

History of AAC Tournaments (final)

ST SEBASTIAN since 1993

Another novelty shoot held on the Sunday nearest to 21st January but not to coincide with another tournament. Barbeque held after the shoot.

LORD MAYOR'S TEAM SHOOT

The club started to pay 50% of the entry fee during the 1990's to encourage entry by club members. The club would pay the entry fee then the team members would reimburse the club their half of the entry fee.

BREAK-UP

Originally, we used to have one event about 4-11 days prior to Christmas on a Sunday. All archers were invited with their families. We used to have Father Christmas arrive to give out presents to up to 20 children (provided by parents). I remember him arriving by walking, car or motorbike. The format was to shoot a novelty round followed by an arrow throwing competition. BBQ tea and then Father Christmas. Hangers on after the event may have left about 8pm. When the junior component of the club started to deteriorate for this event a decision was made to hold the event on a Saturday one year and alternate to Sunday the next year.
