FROM THE PRESIDENT DANIEL CAON

Our club continues to grow, with 294 members at the end of the financial year, and 311 as of this week. We have doubled in 4 years! More members mean higher costs and more work, and our club officers, officials and a small group of volunteers have kept our club



running smoothly. As a not-for-profit organisation, the club is run by the members for the members, so remember to treat the club facilities well, as they are yours - and help each other out whenever you can

The club's finances continue to be strong this year – I won't steal the thunder of our treasurer – but will add that several members made tax deductible donations to the club totalling \$1,500 (which we don't have to repay), so thanks to all of those donors! We also received a \$100,000 building grant from the City of Adelaide and a \$3,000 equipment grant from the ORSR (Office of Recreation Sports and Racing). Unfortunately, we missed out on a State Government facility grant to provide funds to start our building extension, but we will apply again at the end of September. If we are unsuccessful again, I suspect we may have to start the process anyway.

There are more people practicing at the club outside of regular shooting times; it is great that our members are getting value from their membership. Also, we have an agreement with some training groups (namely Para archers and Invictus archers) to rent our facilities, which raises additional funds. Archery is getting more popular!

Remember, if you have a suggestion or query, discuss it with a club official or bring it to one of the monthly General Meetings – together we can continue to improve our club.

FROM THE LIBRARIAN, STEVE SYKES



It's been a bit of a rollercoaster ride for Bow International in the past few months, finally resulting in a welcome return to publication.

As a result, we have received Edition Numbers 170 and 171 in the past month. Both will be left on the table for member perusal over the remainder of October and into November.

Edition 170 includes a special on Field Archery

"Barebow: getting your string picture right" discusses arrows landing left and right in relation to the archer's string picture, which is bringing string blur into aiming and improving target accuracy, particularly at longer distances. Read on

"Field technique tips" has a little bit of something for everyone considering or involved with field archery. Topics covered include getting the basics right, equipment, judging distances on unmarked rounds, on-course gear for recurve shooters, tips for compounders and working with distances for barebow enthusiasts.

"6 Recurve mistakes you're probably making" covers, as the title suggests, issues for recurve archers from not making sure limb tips are straight, through to sticking with the wrong arrow spine.

"Arrows: the next level" is the last instalment of a series on arrow building. Not all arrows are created equally and this article looks at what can be done to build a set of arrows a cut above the rest.

"Compound: taking its place" looks at the myths surrounding the 'dark side' and its place in archery and possible Olympic inclusion. For those interested, the "myths" include "Compound archery is cheating because it's too easy" and "You don't need to practice as much with a compound" amongst others.

"How old is the bow and arrow" addresses a long-puzzling question with new evidence appearing in France. Often described as one of the first advance pieces of technology. Exactly when bows and arrows entered the human world has occupied researchers for hundreds of years and, because objects made from wood rarely survive, it has been finding and interpreting arrowheads (as opposed to spear points) that has aided the quest for dating the origins of archery

Edition 171 with a new editor, is the European Games Special with a full report of this event from Krakow. And also of the World Archery Youth championships held in Limerick. It includes

Interviews with World Archery's coach of the year Richard Priestman, which is part one of talent spotting;

Ella Gibson talks about the possible inclusion of compound in the LA28 Olympics;

Duncan Busby covers compound technique focussing on finding the 'perfect' bow arm - should it be bent or straight?

A special feature article is written by the new editor on South Korean, Ki Bo Bae, the "queen of recurve."

The usual history section has an excellent article by Jan Sachers on the Tudor Archery manual "Toxophilus, the Schole of Shootinge" - the oldest known European guide published in 1545.
