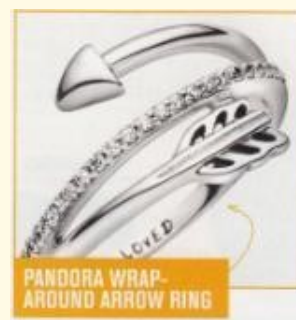

FROM THE LIBRARIAN, STEVE SYKES

This year's **Ultimate Gear** Issue of Bow International (Vol. 167) has arrived.

As usual, the articles highlighted in this report are just a selection to be found in the current edition now in the club room. There are other more newsy items and reports from competitions that members may wish to read about while the current edition is available for reading in the club room or when it can be borrowed on loan.

Ultimate Gear features risers, limbs and bows, with significant price tags, to smaller items such as tabs, grips, arrow rests, hats, at lower costs, and gear in between, there are 8 pages to peruse if you are in the market for some new equipment. For those looking for something a little different, the Rinehart 3D Velociraptor target or the Pandora Wrap Around Arrow ring may appeal.



Field and 3D Archery are the subject of 4 excellent pages well worth reading. The article suggests that shooting field teaches skills leading to a better overall archer and it looks at what needs to be learned if venturing into this aspect of our sport. Apparently, due to all the variables involved, field is the thinking archer's game!

Archery Trade Association of America's annual show: This 5 page report covers some equipment on show not necessarily covered in the gear guide.

Building Arrows: The second instalment follows on from the previous issue and focuses on ways of achieving a good bond between the shaft and the other pieces of hardware that are fitted to get the best possible arrows

The usual **"Ask the Experts"** covers motivation, especially lack of it, with answers from two contributors.

The History Piece this month looks at the 18th century and in particular the revival of archery as a sport.



Archery still had a military significance during the 15th and 16th centuries, but by the 17th century the bow and arrow had fallen out of martial art use due to advances in other weapons. At this time, archery was largely competition shooting as a pastime. This article charts the progress of the formation of societies and clubs that led to an 18th century revival, to be consolidated during the 19th century and go on to form the basis of modern archery.

As a beginner and new member, I would be fascinated to learn what kit AAC Archers are using, and I'm sure others would be too. I just read the enchanting interview with **Heidi Monk** in the Archery SA newsletter where she mentioned what bow she was shooting (Recurve MK Alpha). I had never heard of it!

It could take the form of a simple bullet point email template something like this:

Bow type? Compound (C), Long Bow (L) or Recurve (R)

Bow set-up? Barebow, Olympic etc

Bow manufacturer and model? E.g. WNS Motive FX

Bow limbs and draw weight? E.g. WNS Explore W1, 26#

Sight manufacturer and model? E.g. Avalon Carbon Tech One

Plunger manufacture and model? E.g. Avalon Tech One Micro Click

Finger tab manufacturer and model? E.g. Fivics Saker 1, Cordovan leather

Arrow manufacturer, material and model? E.g. Alpha, carbon, X Target

With club membership increasing steadily (now standing at 280, up from less than 200 pre-covid) and with many visiting archers, the pressure on the club equipment and butts is enormous. For example, beginners often destroy arrows and give bows and other equipment a hard time, so that they require constant upkeep and replacement. And if you think of four people shooting at one butt at least three times a week, that is over 1000 arrows No wonder the target faces and butts wear out so quickly
