
Daniel also claimed a Fleetwood medal (all red). *Graham Winston*

HELP FOR BEGINNERS AND NEW MEMBERS

Remember how lost you felt when you were starting out? Either a kind member helped you (and you still remember them) or else you struggled through on your own.

Many new archers drop out at this stage as it is all too hard.



Now a buddy system to help beginners on the 4-week trial and new members to get organised.

Please assist new archers and encourage other members to do the same!

A copy of the suggestions below is pinned next to the target allocation board, for quick reference.

Initial tasks (prior to shooting)

Approach them and welcome them to the club Introduce them to the field captain

Show them the shooting register to sign in

Point out the target allocation board and get them to write their name at 20m

Take them into the clubroom to accept their payment for range fee and equipment hire

Show them into the equipment room to select bows and arrows (do they remember what they used previously), and get a bow stringer from behind the door

Show them the drawer with the arm guards and finger tabs

Help them to setup their gear out on the lawn Show them the target cupboard and the scoresheets

Ask if they'd like to do some practice prior to the shoot (if time permits)

When shooting starts

Explain how the field captain has laid out the field and which target they will be using If using a portable butt, offer to take it out for them

Assist them to open the target and pin on a face Assist them on the shooting line - ask if they want some refresher tips

Join them for the shoot! Or, shoot on the next target

During the shoot, chat to them and explain what's going on

When it's break time, explain what is happening, mention the Canteen and the Notices

When shooting ends

Explain how the field is closed down (targets covered, portables packed away)

Point to the safety flags and how they will be closed up

Show them where completed scoresheets are placed

Explain that everyone helps to pack up Finally, farewell them.

ELECTRONIC TIMER

The ASA timers have been trialled for a month and some feedback is

Easier for the Field Captain (FC), as the time counts down automatically Everyone is aware of the time, so the FC doesn't have to police it Members liked it – positive about it.

Setup took a while; we'll need volunteers to carry out 2 (or 4) units.

Carrying out the units may interrupt shooters undertaking practice.

Sometimes there are startup/setup issues – which can be alleviated by a trial run at the start.

Further Discussion

We previously passed the motion to buy a timer for our club, but it was unclear whether we'd require 4 boxes/ screens instead of just 2. It is suggested we need 4, because of:

- 1. the large size of our grounds, and
- 2. the permanent targets being tiered into 3 groups, rather than one continuous long line, so placement of 2 displays may not be visible by all archers.

The previous motion may have to be reviewed

What we'll need altogether.

- 2 sets of timers; \$6662.39, quite possibly more
- a volunteer to keep them charged. Andy Cooper has put up his hand for the task
- a power board wired into the building in a safe location. (This electrical work is not yet costed)
- 4 tripods; approx. \$100 each
- perhaps a trolley to move the timers and tripods. \$100 or more That's a total of \$7,300.

NEW EDITION OF BOW INTERNATIONAL

Issue 158 is now available for member perusal in the club house.

The major headline is "Ultimate Gear Guide". This article is the annual review of what is considered as the very best new/recent archery kit. If you are in the market for some new gear with a generous budget, this edition is a must read.

Arrows

This is an edition with a strong bias towards arrows and in particular the Easton company, which is 100 years young. A potted history of this family business is provided and covers early days of pine and cedar, through aluminium and on to carbon/aluminium hybrid shafts. It also covers the Easton diversification into other sports equipment.

(Until my archery phase, I always associated Easton with baseball, being a father of two baseball-mad sons and a personal involvement in coaching youth teams).

Helpful Hormone

There is an article on the hormone that either helps or hinders the archer's performance, *viz*. adrenaline. Another physiology-based article covers indoor exercises useful for maintaining an archer's fitness.

Korean Traditional Archery (KTA)

Traditional archery gets good coverage in this edition with a report on Korean Traditional Archery or KTA, in which the author discusses a recent visit to Korea and the use of a new bow. There is also the first of a new two-part series on traditional bow making in the UK.



History of AAC Tournaments (continued)

WAND since 1985

Back in the day, Les Crawford made a trophy which he offered to ASSA for a tournament. They declined the offer, so it was offered to the club for a Tournament. It had a compound bow on the front of it.

It was decided to have a new "light relief" tournament as we already had a lot of tournaments and hold it in the winter months. As this trophy seemed to be for Compound Archers, Carol Ashlee said she would donate another one for Recurve Archers. A Juniors' trophy was donated by the Casperson family in 1989. In 1994 when Longbow Archers started to become prolific, a trophy for them was procured. This happened to be a quiver that had been at the club for some time and was converted into a trophy.

CITY OF ADELAIDE since 2003

Originally was an Archery SA event. When they decided not to hold it, AAC requested to take it over as a tournament. It was decided to hold it as a FITA 900 instead of a straight out FITA event.

We kept the same date of 2nd Sunday in February, but decided to hold it early in the day to combat the possible heat of later in the day. Lunch was optional at the end of the shoot at a local hotel, at archers' expense. Trophies included a glass for the winner and medals for all place getters. These were specially made with Colonel Light on them to represent Adelaide. Categories were male and female in Recurve, Compound and Longbow, but no age categories.
