

STATE CLOUT TOURNAMENT 20 AUGUST AT KAPUNDA



Clout archery requires comfortable and sturdy walking shoes, extra stamina, substantial patience, and an altered technique. Adjusting to shooting long distances is both a novelty and an idiosyncratic fascination. Juniors shoot from 100 m or more, and seniors up 180 metres. That's quite a distance! The clout, or centre, is a small triangle, while the target lies flat on the ground, and has a diameter of 15 metres. The scoring circles are marked with flags, as seen in this photo (below) from 2021.



To compete in the State Clout event, our dedicated AAC contingent, over 30 of them, got up early that morning, crept bleary eyed into their cars, and drove through mist, uphill and down dale, to reach the Kadina Trotting Club.

It was a double clout, taking up the whole day and was hosted very effectively by the Light Archers.

Our members won awards aplenty, approximately 12 golds, a bunch of silvers, and a handful of bronze. But there were other awards (rewards) as well; the convivial company, the mouth-watering food (burgers and cake), seeing arrows sail high into the clouds and landing beyond, and possibly receiving a shout of congratulations in the car park when preparing to drive home.

Thank you to **Gerry Davies** and **Andrew Burton** for making target faces when they were in short supply. As membership has increased so has the turnover of target faces. Paul and Kevin were travelling at the time and, with competitions looming and centres being shot out, Gerry and Andrew did the essential backup work.

For those archers using sights on their bows, during practice, please offset the sights so the arrows group outside the centre. We practise to shoot groups and it doesn't take many arrows to get reasonable sight settings. Hence, if you are not formally scoring, group elsewhere. This will decrease the workload on our volunteers.

Also, please do not put unusable practice targets back into the practise target cupboard but scrunch them down hard and jam them into one of the three council bins at the back of the clubhouse.

VALE KEITH CASPERSON 1941-2023

The club has, sadly, lost another much-loved and long standing member.

Keith was assistant equipment officer for some years and in that role was always willing to help other club members. His good humour, patience, and caring nature endeared him to all who knew him

With his wife, Jill, he was a welcome participant in many club social functions.



Keith grew up in Vancouver, Canada, after his parents migrated from Norway. His family were hard-working and enthusiastic about learning and sports, but Keith at first achieved success in a Viennese Waltz competition. His father's influence saw him win a scholarship to attend the University of British Columbia, where he took an honours degree in zoology. After travelling in south east Asia for many months he took a job in Perth to earn his passage home. However, he successfully applied for a job with CSIRO in Canberra, which led to many other jobs in his field. So, instead of going home, he spent the rest of his life in Australia, working in many different positions in his field, finally taking a research position with the South Australian Department of Environment and Planning. This entailed flora and fauna survey trips all over South Australia, and the publication of a number of books. At about this time, the early 1980s, Keith took up the sport of archery, and continued until he was no longer able to shoot.
